We've been blessed. St. Vincent's and Marillac Friends Bring Joy and Hope to Local Communities

The 2010 holiday season at St. Vincent de Paul Center was as exciting as ever.

Hundreds of donors, staff and volunteers came together to provide a Christmas to remember, through aweinspiring kindness and selfless generosity. We embraced traditions, both new and old, and celebrated one very important anniversary!

"Santa Mike" and Friends celebrated their 40th anniversary this Christmas, marking four decades of gift-giving to the children and families

here at St. Vincent's. The group has also hosted the annual Senior Dinner Party for nearly 35 years. This year over 300 local senior citizens came together for an evening of dinner and socializing. A record-breaking 425 homeless clients

attended the annual Outreach Luncheon also hosted by Santa Mike, where volunteers served a traditional Thanksgiving meal with all the trimmings. In addition, each individual received a coat, thermal underwear, a sleeping bag, a hat, and gloves.

For years, Holy Family Parish in Inverness has donated much-needed items to each of our programs. This year, parishioners provided:

- contributions to our food pantry,
- \$2,235 in gift cards for our Senior clients,
- 345 gift cards totaling \$10,750 to families in our Child Development Program,
- gift bags and toys for 36 families at the Center.



St. Vincent's also received 194 wrapped gifts for each School-Age child and three large bags of clothing for our Seniors and Homeless Outreach Clients (See St. Vincent de Paul, Page 2)

Outside organizations donated their time and talents throughout the month. The talented Maine South Hawkettes performed their Christmas Program for the children at the Center. Teachers and children in the Early Childhood Student Classrooms performed a spirited recital, which was well-attended by family and friends, and the School Age program performance included poems, songs and skits. The Society of Actuaries and Bolingbrook High School hosted parties for the School-Age children.

On December 17th the Weber Stephen Products company hosted its 30th annual Christmas Party for 100 children and teens. The Weber Stephen staff joined the children for activities such as eating a traditional family-style sit down Christmas dinner, dancing, constructing teddy bears, and jumping in the moonwalk, and then ended with a special visit from Santa. Through additional support from local organizations, churches and individuals, each child in Early Childhood and School Age received a present for Christmas.

Generous donations and the Greater Chicago Food Depository kept the shelves stocked during the holidays, thus enabling the Food Pantry to continue to provide for over 600 clients a month. The Family Service Christmas Sale served over 330 families, including 1,000 children. The families received a turkey, food bag and a toy for each child. Almost 100 volunteers donated their time to make this day special for our families. Doug Hewitt and his mentors celebrated Christmas with their mentor group and families with games, fun and presents.

At a time when many families struggle, it is amazing to see the great lengths our constituents extended themselves to make someone's Christmas special. We are so blessed and grateful to have such wonderful people who share their time, gifts, money and love with Marillac.

NAEYC Awards St. Vincent de Paul Center Accreditation

St. Vincent de Paul Center was reaccredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) in January. In the 25 years since NAEYC Accreditation was established, it has become a widely recognized sign of high-quality early childhood education. Eight percent of pre-school and early Childhood programs are currently accredited by NAEYC. Marillac's early childhood program was also reaccredited last year.

The NAEYC Accreditation system has set voluntary professional standards for programs for young children since 1985. In September 2006, the Association revised program standards and criteria to introduce a new level of quality, accountability, and service for parents and children in early childhood programs.

The new standards today reflect the latest research and best practices in early childhood education and development.

St. Vincent's would like to thank the faculty and staff for their contributions toward this tremendous achievement.

Advocacy Ounce of Prevention Fund Ensures High-Quality Early Childhood Programs

The Ounce of Prevention Fund works to ensure that public policies and a strong infrastructure are in place, and adequately funded to give vulnerable children access to voluntary, high-quality early childhood programs.

The Ounce has worked for more than 25 years to help policymakers in Illinois develop a sophisticated understanding about the science behind early childhood education so that they will direct public funding toward the most effective programs and reach children most in need. Through their Kids Public Education and Policy Project (Kids PEPP), the agency has helped turn Illinois's early learning system into a national model.

Today, they are working to replicate their success in Illinois in states across the country. Their national policy consultation team closely mentors advocates, practitioners, and funders to help them build and strengthen their states' early childhood systems.
